

Battling Invasive Species Presentation



New Salem Habitat Restoration Project



THE PROBLEM	THE SOLUTION	THE PROJECT
<p>Non-native bush honeysuckle, autumn olive, multiflora rose and garlic mustard are invading our forests. They form dense thickets that shade the forest floor, preventing native trees and wildflowers from reproducing.</p>  <p>The loss of native plants means the loss of wildlife dependent on those plants. For example, oak trees--the dominant trees in our forests--provide food for about 100 different animals.</p> 	<p>New Salem Habitat Restoration Unit A--Approx 65 Acres</p>    <p>Remove invasive plants from approximately 65 acres on Cardinal Ridge.</p> <p>Treated areas will be monitored annually for regrowth and treated appropriately.</p> <p>IDNR will conduct periodic burns when conditions are right. Fire will help suppress the regrowth of invasive species, while enhancing conditions for hardwood regeneration and a lush herbaceous understory.</p> <p>Woody invasive plants are cut and the stumps treated with herbicide. Cut shrubs are stacked in piles throughout the work zone.</p> <p>Garlic mustard is hand-pulled and disposed of appropriately to minimize reseeding.</p>	 <p>Under the supervision of the IDNR Division of Natural Heritage, Menard County Trails & Greenways has prepared and implemented a restoration plan. 


